2017-18 Enrollment

Dear Families,

The Board of Trustees would like to begin the enrollment process for 2017-18 by thanking all of you for your continued support of our school and community. There is no greater gift than education and the Board is constantly mindful of the challenges faced and sacrifices made so that our families might give that gift to their children.

Harbor School continues to develop and we are wonderfully positioned for growth, with a strong, unique program and a fantastic faculty and staff. The energy of a talented and dedicated Board combined with the support and engagement of our parent community will continue to fuel our progress.

2016 was a year filled with many highlights: the completion of our first full year as a K through 8th Grade school, the culmination of our Head Search, the introduction of a Spanish language program across all grades, over \$140,000 dedicated to our Financial Aid programs that supported 28 students across all grades, the addition of faculty members Russ Ray, Todd Wooster and Kim Thal, the adoption of Singapore Math as our new math curriculum, a new playset for our main campus, and our first 8th grade graduate from West Seattle to name a few!

Guided by our mission as well as a responsibility to safeguard and hold in trust the integrity of the education offered at Harbor School, the Board has voted to increase tuition for the 2017-18 academic year by 3%.

2017-2018 Tuition

Carpe Diem (Kindergarten - 3rd Grade)	\$9,670
Upper Elementary (4th & 5th Grade)	\$10,705
Middle School (6th, 7th & 8th Grade)	\$13,990

This increase will allow us to continue to meet our cost expenses while still preserving the depth and breadth of the programs we offer.

Families will receive their re-enrollment contracts for 2017-18 at the end of next week. **We ask that all families submit their signed re-enrollment contracts and deposits no later than January 30, 2017.**

Climbing Higher Every Day

To all our families (*alumni and grandparents too!*) and friends who made a year-end gift to the Harbor Fund over the holiday break, Thank You! We leapt 8% in participation! We're getting closer and closer to our goal of 100% participation from our school community.

As our holiday e-news highlighted, we have much to be proud of as we wrap up 2016 and move into 2017.

Here's a look back on many milestones from 2016:

- ☆ We completed our first year as a Kindergarten through 8th Grade school - *becoming the only independent K-8 program on Vashon Island.*
- ☆ Our Board of Trustees hired **Mark McGough** as our new Head of School, thanks in large part to an outstanding search committee made up of alumni, parents, faculty and trustees.
- ☆ Our 8th Grade Class Trip added a new destination to our Travel Study program when they journeyed to Iceland in May!
- ☆ A new playset was added to our main campus thanks to the generous support (*and volunteer labor!*) of our families and friends.
- ☆ We introduced a new Spanish Language program that now spans all grades, and hired a new Spanish teacher, **Russ Ray**.
- ☆ We welcomed new Middle School English Teacher **Todd Wooster!**
- ☆ We began a comprehensive curriculum alignment project, under Mark's leadership, to map the academic journey that now begins in kindergarten and ends in 8th grade.
- ☆ Singapore Math was adopted as our new math curriculum, and Geometry was added as a new offering for our middle school students. We welcomed **Kim Thal** to our faculty as our Geometry teacher!
- ☆ We continued our dedication in serving our community through student-led and faculty-driven projects (*teamed with VARSAs to clean up Vashon, created the Kindness Project, and visited our elders at VCC, just to name a few!*)
- ☆ We graduated our first West Seattle student from 8th grade in June - *We miss you, Elias!* We now have 5 student commuters who journey by boat each morning.
- ☆ Over \$140,000 was dedicated to Financial Aid, providing support to 28 students across all grades.
- ☆ More than 1,000 volunteer hours were given in support of our school community by parents, grandparents, alumni families, board trustees and friends.

Our appreciation and gratitude to all of you for supporting our school, giving of your time, being ambassadors to new families, and sharing in our mission to “inspire young scholars to contribute their wisdom, compassion, and personal best, in the classroom, the community, and the world.”

Crystal Mountain Ski Day

Every year Harbor School takes the 4th through 8th grade students and faculty to Crystal Mountain for a day of skiing as part of our Winter Sports program. Please review the details below and feel welcome to ask any questions you may have!

WHAT: Ski Day at Crystal Mountain

DATE: Friday, January 13, 2017

TIME: Drop-off is by 6:15 AM at Harbor School. (Pick-up is estimated to be approximately 5:40 PM at Harbor School.)

WEST SEATTLE FAMILIES: We will be taking the 7 AM ferry from Vashon to Fauntleroy. West Seattle students should be at the Barton end of the ferry dock by 7:20 AM so we may pick them up. We will be returning to Vashon on the 5:10 PM ferry, so we will aim to have West Seattle students ready for pick up at the Barton end of the ferry dock by 5:00 PM. If there are any major variances we will give you a call.

TRANSPORTATION: We reserved a big First Student bus that will transport all students and faculty.

FOOD: Participants should bring a BIG lunch, snacks, and a water bottle. Energy from food and water are essential! Students may also wish to bring pocket money to purchase a hot cocoa in the lodge.

GEAR LIST: Please review the attached gear list to review the needs for our outing. We will rent gear at Crystal for anyone who needs board or skis, boots, poles, and helmet. Please note: if you are bringing your own gear, you need to bring your own ski helmet!

COST: Trip cost will be \$86 per participant. If this cost creates a hardship for your family, please let Jackie know. We do not want anyone to feel they cannot participate due to lack of funds. We ask that payment be sent in to the school office by Wednesday, February 1, 2017.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: My child has no ski experience, will they be able to participate?

A: Yes! Madame Blair surveyed all of the students and assessed their level of experience with skiing. We have many students who are “new to the slopes” and we will have them start their day with ski lessons!

Q: My child does not have any gear, will it cost to rent items?


A: No. The \$86 fee is all inclusive. There are no additional charges for lessons or gear or the bus or anything else. Students may bring some pocket money if they want to buy a warm drink (*no more than \$5*).

Q: My child does not have snow pants / a snow jacket / etc., as we don't do snowsports regularly— what is expected?

A: If you feel that your child does not have appropriate gear based on the attached gear list, please let us know what you are specifically missing. We have a lot of support in our community from people who have outgrown gear or who have extra gear to lend. We don't want anyone to feel that they are not equipped to join in on the fun!

CALL FOR SNOW GEAR! If you have any old or extra gear (such as snow pants, waterproof gloves, snow jackets, snow hats, etc.) that you are willing to loan or pass along for the use of others during our ski outing, please let us know! Your support is greatly appreciated!

Race Equity Discussion

I attended the race equity discussion at Vashon High School on Monday, December 12. I want to share my experience of attending the discussion and encourage the Carpe Diem Harbor School community to participate in this community-wide endeavor. I am aware of at least two other parents in our school community who attended and several who have been part of the email discussions thus far. I want to help further harness that energy and share with those that may not be aware of this race equity conversation happening in our broader Vashon Schools community.

The discussion began with a speech by a former student of Vashon High School. She spoke with great courage about her experiences as a student of color at Vashon schools. She grew up here and loves this community; however, she expressed that she experienced varying levels of systemic racism and of feeling isolated.

She spoke for about 40 minutes; afterwards, we broke out into small groups and broadly discussed the school district's mission statement with respect to race equity and some specific ideas of what can be done. The action ideas ranged from hiring a more diverse staff, trainings and discussions for teachers and parents, and books and resources that not only address race equity issues directly but incorporate people of color naturally.

I would love to take advantage of this existing effort and form a race equity focus group of parents from all of our K-8 community. I envision our school having a formal presence in these community-wide discussions. I also have hopes that we can develop some similar strategies for our school community. I would like to help organize a group of interested parents to meet and discuss how we can and to what extent we want to participate in this community-wide endeavor; please send an email to Rebecca.a.lanphear@gmail.com if you would like to be part of this.

For those that are not familiar with the race equity work that has been going on at the school district here is a little background information. The initial discussions started about a year ago.

Michael Soltman, VISD Superintendent stated:


"Our district is excited to be creating a plan and to advance efforts to build understanding and actions to enhance equity in education for all students on Vashon. VISD is working in partnership with community members, who recently formed a racial equity committee, and the Puget Sound Educational Service District (PSESD) to achieve three goals over the next several months:

- 1. To convene a District Equity Team** comprised of key stakeholders to engage in an equity self-assessment to oversee the development of an equity plan for the district.
- 2. To conduct a district data analysis** in order to gain critical insight regarding the current academic and social/emotional experiences of students and families of color.
- 3. To provide professional learning opportunities** for multiple audiences including but not limited to leaders, teachers, counselors, paraprofessionals, and front office staff designed to expand their capacity to develop racially equitable systems and classrooms. Specifically, to develop skills and strategies for eliminating individual, institutional and structural racism."

We love Math!

At Carpe Diem one of the most important ways we practice math skills and explore math concepts is through games, and one of my favorite resources for Math Games and activities is the website **Math 4 Love**. This organization, run by Daniel Finkel and based in Seattle, is dedicated to training math educators and transforming how math is taught and learned. Daniel's goal is "to give everyone the chance to fall in love with mathematics". Daniel says "Play is to math what books are to reading," and reminds us of how Einstein called play the "highest form of research." This year I have had the exciting opportunity to join a "Math Teacher Circle" led by Daniel. These are monthly meetings for math teachers where Daniel presents ideas and activities that can be brought back into the classroom. Teachers also have the opportunity to discuss their experiences and share ideas. Our first meetings were about "Number Talks," and a variety of K-3 games for developing mathematical thinking. Not only are the games taught, but attention is also given to how to ask questions and guide student thinking to facilitate mathematical realizations through the process of play. The meetings are inspiring, energizing, and challenging, and have already enriched my teaching and your childrens' learning.

Carpe Diem kids are all set to share our love of math games with the wider community - we are excited to have parent Rebecca Lanphear spearheading our upcoming **Game Time!** event (see flyer image on page 4) at Carpe Diem to do just that!

Storytelling & Basket Weaving with Barb

This week, Barb Gustafson visited to share her love and knowledge of indigenous storytelling with *Team Pizzazz*. (Check out our facebook page for a video snapshot!) Here's a note from Barb herself describing this hands-on opportunity:

"I first explain to the students how they will learn by 'watching and copying' me. This was and continues to be a common teaching method with the Native American elders. I take on the persona of 'Kaya,' or grandmother, and share some myths and stories about the local Native Americans as I weave a basket. I bring in examples of baskets woven with cedar and explain how the red cedar tree was the 'Tree of Life' for the people of the Pacific Northwest. The students are then provided the materials for creating their woven vessel and dive in. I will have jute, raffia, yarn and natural materials for the sides of the baskets. The bases are solid and pre-drilled. The spokes are reed. When the baskets are completed the students decide whether to add handles. I also have a short slideshow with images of and information about traditional baskets."

Colonizing the New World: Simulation

In their final week of colonizing the New World, colonists and native nations became quite perturbed, agitated, and ill. *Why are you encroaching on my land? Why is the fishing, hunting and farming going SO poorly? Where's that ship with all of the supplies the government was supposed to send me? What happens if I don't actually pay back my debts?*

Students wrapped up their colonizing experience and we debriefed all of these valuable life lessons gained from our experiences, gaining insight into how people felt back in the 1600s-1700s and why they may have made the choices they did, what we'd do differently if we could, and how teamwork effects outcomes.

Writing


This week, students took on a persona of one of the colonists in the New World (from our simulation). They wrote diary entries about their thoughts and experiences since arriving in the New World as it's been a whole year! The harsh winter, disease, and deaths are taking a toll, and they wrote about how they feel about surviving, as well as their thoughts about the future for their colony. Additionally, students did a creative writing assignment about an uprising that's happening in the colonies, as many are outraged with the governor, Governor Moore. *Should he be overthrown? Why is he putting all these laws into place all of a sudden? Why is he hoarding all of the medicine and food?* Students had varied responses to these complex situations.

Math

We're kicking off a WHOLE new unit this week, that's not only PARTLY fun, but is a hands-on adventure. Disguised as "playing with toys," students are learning about fractions as a part of a whole. Topics explored this week include understanding and representing unit fractions via fraction blocks, rectangular grids, and line segments. Come on in and have your mathematician show you how pattern blocks can be used to interpret complicated fraction concepts.

6TH Grade

Students started the Washington State Spring Ferry Schedule cover competition! To prepare for the contest student spent their class time this week learning about what makes a strong composition, how to use negative space, and how to achieve various value levels with pen and ink techniques. Students will design a black and white / grayscale drawing or painting on 8½ x 11 portrait oriented paper to submit to the contest. The theme is ferries and wildlife, and the artwork must include imagery of ferries or elements of a ferry. The homework is to sketch out ideas so that they can get a headstart on this project.

7TH Grade

Students took some time to imagine what January of 2018 will feel like, and to set a goal to get there in style. Students chose a word that describes their New Year's resolution (*for those who want a bit of self-improvement*), or a New Year's contribution (*for those who want to make an impact in any of their many communities*). We started small posters to refresh our color and layout skills to showcase the word we chose. The homework is to finish your poster, hang it up in your space at home, and start getting inspired.

8TH Grade

We warmed up after the break with a figure and portrait drawing open studio. The homework is to draw a 30-minute grid sketch (*one to one*) of yourself from your photo.

Spanish with Profe

6TH Grade

We continue our story, *Sandra y el vestido perfecto* (*Sandra & the perfect dress*). This week we did some writing and wrestled with grammar structures in *a ficha* (*packet*).

7TH Grade

We continue reading *Las aventuras de Isabela*. This week we completed *a ficha* (*packet*) on Chapter 1. Next week we will complete packets on Chapters 2 & 3.

8TH Grades

We continue reading *Las aventuras de Isabela*. This week we completed *a ficha* (*packet*) on Chapter 3. Next week we will complete packets on Chapters 4 & 5.

Math with Leslie

Juicy Tidbits from Math Land

MATH 6

Sixers just finished an amazingly short chapter on **Negative Numbers**. Monday we will begin **Chapter 5: Ratios** where we will learn to compare quantities using ratios and use ratio language to describe a ratio relationship between two quantities, simplify ratios and find equivalents and relate ratios to fractions. Students are bringing home a Chapter 3 packet for you to sign.

MATH 7

We continue with **Chapter 3: Inequalities** where we write inequalities and graph their solutions on number lines and solve inequalities by adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing.

PRE-ALGEBRA

Students are partway through their review of **Chapter 4: Algebraic Manipulation**. We will finish up our review on Tuesday and begin **Chapter 5: Simple Equations in One Variable** where we will learn to solve linear equations in one variable, solve simple fractional equations and form linear equations in one variable to solve problems.

Algebra with Zoë

Our new unit, **Linear Equations**, is off and running. Students are practicing finding the slope and y-intercept of lines, graphing lines from equations and writing equations from graphs of lines.

Geometry with Kim

Pathagoras Dreams

The perfect structural form: Universal Trine

Geometry students are studying congruent triangles from all possible angles. We are appreciating the strength and stability of this perfect structural form.

Social Studies with Laurretta

6TH Grade

This week students worked on an essay wherein they advised a high-ranking U.S. government official on what NOT to do, and what TO do in order to keep America a thriving civilization – based on the lessons learned about the downfall of Athens.

7TH Grade

Students worked on an essay that required them to create mandates for the people they ruled (*the scenario starts with... You are Emperor of the Universe*) based on the monotheistic religions they just examined. Once the essay is turned in, that wraps up Comparative Religion. We will begin **Introduction to the Middle East** next week.

8TH Grade

We are deep into the **Big, Wide Wonderful Project**. An invitation will be going out in the near future on the date and time of the 8th grade presentation.

English with Todd

Happy New Year! We began all English classes this week with New Year's resolutions, trying to keep in mind both our wishes and what obstacles might impede those wishes. Perhaps we're trying to listen to Thoreau and his insistent advice: "Renew thyself completely each day: do it again, and again, and forever again."

6TH Grade

This week we began a unit on persuasive writing with our 'Five Best, Five Worst' essays. Students have been asked to choose the best and worst of a category of their own choosing and then defend their choices. I've seen some very interesting categories, but I'm also excited to see students beginning to use language that articulates reasons and justifications.

7TH Grade

We read and analyzed Kurt Vonnegut Jr.'s dystopic and uproarious short story, "Harrison Bergeron," a tale that depicts a frightening future where equality is enforced and competition is shunned. Once recovering from the shock of the story, we talked about what Vonnegut's warning to us might be and what dangers he is highlighting in our present age.

8TH Grade

We continued reading and discussing Thoreau's 'Walden' in 8th grade, paying particular attention to his insistence upon personal spiritual renewal and to the difference between solitude and loneliness. On Friday we spent some class time writing outside, trying to feel - even if briefly - the solitude that Thoreau felt during his two year sojourn at Walden Pond. Eighth graders are also beginning their Forum papers, and this week we began choosing our topics - I've heard some incredibly interesting subjects!

Science with Zoë

6TH Grade

We are trying to answer the age old question of how in the world the three bowls of porridge discovered by Goldilocks could possibly have been such drastically different temperatures! Students are collecting data about heat energy and heat transfer so we can figure out just what was going on in the Three Bears' cottage. During these tests, we have learned about how heat moves through conduction, convection and radiation. Also, students learned how to convert units of temperature (*Celsius, Fahrenheit and Kelvin*). Ask your kiddo about the quick and easy way to convert from Celsius to Fahrenheit. (*Handy for your next trip to Canada!*)

7TH Grade

Before break, students explored several types of potential energy. They learned to calculate the amount of energy in a system, both potential and kinetic. Now, we are trying to answer the age old question of how in the world the three bowls of porridge discovered by Goldilocks could possibly have been such drastically different temperatures! Students are collecting data about heat energy and heat transfer so we can figure out just what was going on in the Three Bears' cottage. During these tests, we have learned about how heat moves through conduction, convection and radiation. Also- students learned how to convert units of temperature (*Celsius, Fahrenheit and Kelvin*). Ask your kiddo about the quick and easy way to convert from Celsius to Fahrenheit. (*Handy for your next trip to Canada!*)

8TH Grade

Before the holiday break, students explored the structure of DNA and the process of protein synthesis (*transcription and translation*). This week, we are looking at meiosis, the process of making sex cells, and pedigree charts using a close look at hemophilia in royal families.


