# Play is the Highest Form of Research

After school on Monday I joined children from Carpe Diem and the wider community to spend an hour playing math games. The energy and engagement in playing was tangible, and I was reminded of a quote attributed to Albert Einstein: 'Play is the highest form of research.' The games were fun, but at the same time the students were analyzing, experimenting, applying and synthesizing as they played.

On Wednesday I found myself at the back of the room as our 8<sup>th</sup> graders presented their research in the **Big Wide Wonderful World Project**. Our 8<sup>th</sup> graders had researched 'The Sacred.' Together they gave a presentation that included a sacred ceremony and a sacred gift as well as the appearance of Miss Frizzle and the Magic School Bus!

It was a thoughtful, considered and serious presentation that was wrapped up in joyfulness and play. This led me to think that if Mr. Einstein had been with us on Wednesday he may have reflected on his thought and turned it around, pondering whether research is in fact the highest form of play.

The Big Wide Wonderful World Project was indeed a research project rooted in play. It provided a dynamic environment that encouraged our 8<sup>th</sup> graders to reason, solve problems, predict, use language and symbols, think creatively, and interact with others – exactly the environment that early years teachers aim to create to encourage play in their classrooms.

And so as I left school on Wednesday, it felt that I could draw a direct line between our Carpe Diem students playing math games on Monday and our 8<sup>th</sup> graders playing with the concept of 'sacred' on Wednesday. That line felt strong and vibrant and the perfect way for us to live out our mission of inspiring our students to contribute their wisdom, compassion and personal best in the classroom.

Congratulations to our 8<sup>th</sup> graders on sharing a high quality research-play project and of course to their inspirational educator, Lauretta Hyde, for her work in inspiring and guiding their work.



# Literature Groups

## Math

Our journey into the wonderful world of fractions is continuing this week, and our focus now is on how to take what we've learned via the Hands On Fractions program and apply it to the Singapore Math curriculum. Concepts covered and practiced this week: equivalents, ordering fractions, and adding and subtracting fractions.

## Narrative Assessments

Get excited, too, for narrative reports to come home for your reading pleasure in a couple short weeks. These detailed and carefully thought-out bits of feedback are an excellent way to get some information about how your student is doing both academically and socially. Too, the main goal of them is to spark a conversation, make changes if needed, highlight what's working, and ensure we're all on the same page in giving your student what they need to live up to their personal-best potential. My attention this week has been on these reports, which explains the shortened and delayed weekly update.

# MIDDLE SCHOOL



#### Social Studies with Lauretta

6<sup>™</sup> Grade

Students are learning about the Roman republic this week, and about the man who brought that Republic down – Julius Caesar. They will also be creating rap songs about Roman accomplishments.

#### 7<sup>™</sup> Grade

We are looking at the Middle East analyzing data, particularly economic data, and comparing countries and hypothesizing what different statistics might mean. For instance, why can a country have a low unemployment rate and yet have a high percentage of people living below the poverty line. Lots of great critical thinking going on!

#### 8<sup>™</sup> Grade

The Big, Wide Wonderful presentation is the sole focus of this week. Kudos to the Class of 2017 for their hard work and creativity in teaching what they learned.

#### Art with Alisara

6<sup>™</sup> Grade

We learned and practiced the tetradic, square, triadic, complementary and split-complementary color schemes in a free draw this week.

#### 7<sup>™</sup> Grade

Students practiced in collaborative teams to improve the two most cited goals, better figure and face drawing.

#### 8<sup>™</sup> Grade

Students worked on their grid self-portrait.

#### Math with Leslie

MATH 6

We are speeding along nicely in **Chapter 6: Rate.** Monday we continue with **Lesson 6.3: Speed.** We will have an investigation of real life practice questions on Tuesday, review on Wednesday and a test on Thursday.

#### ΜΔΤΗ 7

We have just begun **Chapter 4: Ratios, Rates and Proportions** which has seven lessons. Day one, 4.1 went well. Day two, 4.2 using rates to compare was more challenging. We will be pacing ourselves about two class periods per lesson.

#### PRE-ALGEBRA

We are more than halfway through Chapter 5: Simple Equations in One Variable. We have finished 5.3 and will work on 5.4, the final lesson, on Monday. We will have a 'How ready are you for the test?' quiz on Tuesday. Students can then assess where they should focus their study time. Wednesday will be an all class review where I will go over the most commonly missed items on the quiz. If students appear confident we will have the test on Thursday. The study guide was handed out last Thursday.

## Geometry with Kim

This week the geometers learned about four points of concurrency of triangles: circumcenters, incenters, orthocenters, and centroids. We charted the similarities, differences, and interesting attributes of each. Did you know the centroid of a triangle is also it's center of gravity?

## **English with Todd**

6<sup>™</sup> Grade

In 6<sup>th</sup> grade English this week, we presented on our '5 Best, 5 Worst' papers. Students informed us of their choices and reasoning, and the audience was then given an opportunity for questions and observations. I was very impressed with how professional and knowledgeable our presenters were. Great work on this initial foray into persuasive writing!

#### 7<sup>™</sup> Grade

In 7<sup>th</sup> grade, we focused on revising our dystopian short stories, and we handed in a final version on Thursday. In revising we focused, once again, on how to 'show' rather than 'tell' with our writing, and so students attempted to subtly reveal to the reader what their future worlds were like. I continue to marvel at the inventiveness and sophistication of the seventh grade fiction writing.

#### 8<sup>™</sup> Grade

In 8<sup>th</sup> grade, students continued to write their short essays on Thoreau's 'Walden.' Writing on topics like 'nature' or 'morning,' students have been engaged in close readings of Thoreau's words, and they have done an admirable job of deciphering his sometimes gnomic utterances. I look forward to reading the final versions of what they wrote!
